### A Legacy of Nature and Inclusivity

Kent and Leisa Walker, the founders of the Nut Farm, embraced the vision of creating a haven for their son Sam and others associated with a local special needs nonprofit. This 60-acre gem, nestled on the outskirts of Ottumwa just 30 minutes from Fairfield, stands as a testament to their commitment to sustainable food production and community engagement.

The Walkers, along with caretaker Daryle Kaiser, have cultivated nearly 5 acres with paw paws and chestnuts, while dedicating additional acres to prairie restoration, fostering soil health, and inviting pollinators. Windbreaks of poplars and hazelnuts adorn the landscape, dancing behind a solar array at the entrance.

In a remarkable gesture, Kent Walker deeded the property to SILT, ensuring a permanent commitment to sustainability. The donation comes with the stipulation that Daryle can continue to live on-site, infusing new energy into the farm. Daryle has already revitalized a walnut husker, inviting the community to partake in its use. First Resources, a local nonprofit, plans to involve clients in harvesting and selling produce from the Nut Farm.

Kent's vision is rooted in a desire to leave the world a better place, reflecting a love for nature, lowa's landscapes, and a passion for cultivating the land sustainably. The Nut Farm, a former family farm, now stands as an embodiment of sustainable agricultural practices, conservation, and community engagement. Thank you, Kent and Leisa for this incredible gift.

### Getting New Farmers on the Land — Thanks to YOU!








#### **DONATIONS. GRANTS. AND GIFTS**

# **EXPENSE ALLOCATION PROGRAMS: \$370,504**



#### What is a Conservation Easement?

The most common way we help landowners protect their farmland is with a tool called a "conservation easement." A conservation easement is a voluntary legal agreement that allows a landowner to permanently protect their farm as a farm, while retaining ownership and the ability to sell or pass on to heirs. Conservation easements are perpetual. Future owners of the land are held to the terms of the agreement and the Sustainable Iowa Land Trust is responsible for permanently monitoring and enforcing the terms. A conservation easement is an effective tool to keep your land in conservation and farming no matter who owns it in the future. A conservation easement does NOT open your land to the public. Land protected with a conservation easement is still your land and no one has the right to access it without your permission. A future farmstead can be built into the agreement if there isn't one there already. The conservation easement can be tailored to the wishes of the landowners, such as allowing sustainable forestry or running an ag-related business. The conservation easement may apply to all or a portion of the property. Donors may receive an income tax deduction and possible estate tax benefits. We advise landowners to consult with their tax attorney.

Additionally, SILT is excited to introduce three new board members joining our esteemed team:


